Savor moist lamb knuckles and cream-ofcelery soup as you take selfies with portraits of Fidel, Mao and apparatchiks of the Communist Party. Czerwony Wieprzem, once a popular dining spot for communist elites including Vladimir Lenin, dishes out wild boar and mushrooms washed down with a matching selection of wines and spirits that were dreams of the proletariat.
