As we have long stood in solidarity with Iraqi workers struggling for basic union rights under U.S. occupation, we now stand with all American workers seeking those same rights here at home. WE NEED NEW PRIORITIES



We do not accept that the cuts are inevitable because "there is no money." There's a lot of money available if we change our priorities. We call for new priorities in this country that put urgent human needs ahead of war and military spending. As the box on the reverse of this page shows, many state budget deficits would be completely eliminated if even half the taxes people in that state sent to Washington for war would be redirected back to aid state programs. This would continue and enhance the federal aid to states that was part of the 2009 stimulus package and is now coming to an end.
